Masters of Science in Social Work (MSSW)

Proposal for an Accelerated MSSW Degree Plan (AMSSWP)

Description

An increasing number of ACU departments and programs are offering qualified undergraduates the opportunity to integrate undergraduate and professional training by counting graduate course work toward both undergraduate and graduate degrees. Other prestigious universities are also following this path. Currently the number of graduate hours accepted toward ACU undergraduate degrees range from 6 to 24. The School of Social Work is proposing to offer an integrated degree plan for qualified undergraduate students to count up to 24 hours of MSSW graduate study toward elective hours in their BA or BS degree programs by use of University general electives.

The 24 hours of graduate course work will be chosen from required courses in the MSSW two-year curriculum (see *ACU Catalog*, pp. 156-157). Students who participate in this proposed degree plan may take up to nine (9) semester hours of graduate work, per term, in the Summer, Fall, and Spring semesters after they have achieved 90 semester hours with an undergraduate GPA of 3.5 or higher. Students will be advised to take no more than 12 hours including the graduate courses in a regular semester. Students will be awarded their BS or BA degree upon completion of 128 hours.

Rationale and advantages

The most important advantage of the AMSSWP is that it will change the relationship between undergraduate and professional study in social work at ACU. Beginning with degree advising in their second or third year all non-social work majors will be able to see their ACU career as a seamless program concluding in a respected professional credential. This is the professional aspiration most often expressed by undergraduates wishing to change their majors. For the students who choose the AMSSWP, we believe that the choice will change the way they view their undergraduate years from being "more school" to "professional training."

The fact that ACU undergraduates will be able to elect graduate courses will also enhance the challenge of their undergraduate experience.

Accelerated MSSW Degree Plan

We believe the AMSSWP is a unique opportunity for students that will be a strong advantage for recruiting students with non-social work undergraduate degrees who might otherwise choose competing graduate schools for their masters work. It will also be a strong incentive to ACU undergraduates to continue at ACU for their MSSW training. Our review of existing graduate social work programs finds no "competitor" institutions with similar programs for the potential pool of two-year non-social work students.

We have an advising and course scheduling plan that will integrate 6 graduate hours into students' degree programs starting in the Spring 2016 semester. Beginning in Fall 2016, the flexibility to add an additional 18 hours will allow us to create a true BS/BA integrated program so that students can achieve a master's degree and be eligible to apply for licensure in as little as 3 years. The AMSSWP will allow us to accomplish this within a developmentally sound "ACU experience."

Proposed Catalogue text — Accelerated Masters of Science in Social Work

For non-BSSW students who are committed to being a social work practitioner, the School of Social Work offers an integrated degree plan — the Accelerated Masters of Social Work (AMSSWP) — that permits qualified students to count up to 24 hours of graduate study toward both the Bachelor's degree and the Master of Science in Social Work. Students who meet the admission requirements for the AMSSWP may take up to 24 hours of graduate course work in their junior and senior years.

The 24 hours of graduate course work will be chosen from required courses in the Master of Science in Social Work curriculum. Students who participate in this degree plan may take up to 6 semester hours of graduate work in the Summer and 9 semester hours of graduate work in the Fall and Spring semesters after they have achieved 90 semester hours with an undergraduate GPA of 3.5. Students will be advised to take no more than 12 hours, including the graduate courses, in a regular semester. Students will be awarded their Bachelor's degree upon completion of 128 hours.

Interested students are encouraged to seek pre-admission to the AMSSWP after they have completed 30 semester hours by applying to the Graduate Program Director in the School of Social Work. Students must apply to the ACU Graduate School for full admission to the ACU MSSW program in the Fall semester after they have completed 60 hours and have a GPA of 3.50.

Graduate courses will count as general electives or electives in the student's undergraduate major and may not be substituted for required courses in their undergraduate degree.

In order to continue in the AMSSWP students must make no grade lower than B in the graduate courses and maintain a cumulative 3.5 GPA. Individual students' academic programs must be approved by the Graduate Program Director each semester a student participates in the AMSSWP. Final admission to the MSSW program will be based on the student's satisfaction of all graduate admission requirements.

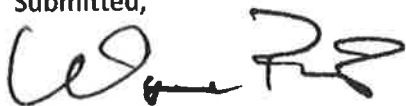
Remaining 6 hours to be added via curriculum revisions at a later date.

Preliminary Fiscal Impact Statement

This proposal will have no impact on the number of credit hours sold for undergraduate students, as it does not reduce the total number of hours required for graduation (128). It does, however, potentially impact the number of graduate hours sold, as students participating in this program will take 18-24 fewer hours in their graduate curriculum. This fall, only one ACU non-BSSW graduate enrolled in the two-year MSSW program; previous years have ranged from 1-3 students per year from ACU.

The School's projections for future years, if this proposal is approved, is for the number of students in this category to increase to 7-8 within four years. If all the increase in ACU recruiting into the two-year MSSW program were to come from this program, the increase in graduate tuition revenue (based on Fall 2015 rates) would still nearly triple over current revenues from this source (a minimum of 320 additional hours sold over a two-year period, versus current rates of 64-128 hours presently generated from this category of new MSSW students).

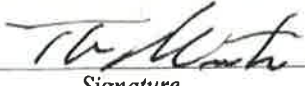
⁵ Program or course changes that apply to any major that includes Teacher Certification will be reviewed by the college, the Teacher Education Council (TEC), and then the UUAC.

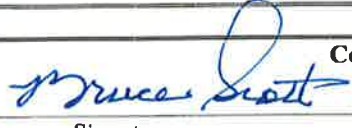

Departments may request exceptions to the first three criteria.

⁷ The UUAC approved the clarification that "general requirements for graduation" means the enumerated items in the "General Requirements for Bachelor's Degrees" section of the catalog.
