Solitude Series: an introduction to the solitude for the rest of us

Do you remember the Fievel Mousekewitz series, particularly the first movie, "An American Tail"? If you don't remember or have not seen the movie, it would be a worthwhile investment of your time and resources to take a few minutes to enjoy it. The story, set in the late 1800s, is about a mouse that immigrates to America with his family, only to become separated from them during the voyage. There is a touching scene where Fievel and his sister are separated, but share a full moon, and a song with these words:

Sometimes we have dark days and nights when we feel truly alone. Life is like that.
