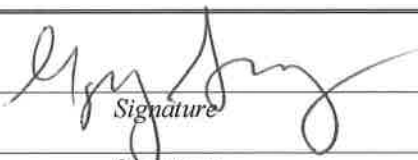

The minor does not have mandatory language requirements in order to accommodate students pursuing BBA or BS degrees.

Hi Ron,

It's good to hear from you; this sounds intriguing. I'd welcome the opportunity to meet over coffee to discuss options. The classes I teach related to "music in world cultures" are near and dear to my heart, and I'm constantly assessing the best way to approach them. I should say that the canon for world music courses isn't as fixed as it tends to be for those focusing on the classical western European tradition. I am willing to consider tweaking what we do and how we do it if that would be beneficial to students in the Global Studies program.

I currently teach two different courses. MUSM 233/Survey of World Music is a 3-hour course, currently meeting fall of even years (but we've discussed offering it every fall) geared toward non-majors. We tend to use a little less musical jargon and focus more on how music can be a window into learning about geography (surprisingly necessary, by the way!), religious traditions and other cultural contexts, etc.

MUSM 131/Music in World Cultures is a 2-hour course geared toward freshmen music majors, music minors, worship ministry majors, etc. It's offered every spring and focuses a bit more on musical traits, but still doesn't get highly technical. We also place a high premium of placing various musical traditions in some sort of cultural context. I've had many non-music majors do extremely well in this class, so musical expertise isn't necessarily an advantage.

I'm attaching syllabi to both; there will be some minor changes made to the MUSM 131 syllabus for this spring. Also attached are the daily schedule to let you see a little more detail about what parts of the world we focus on. (Again, MUSM 131 will be a bit more broad because of a textbook change.) Let me know if you want to meet up.
